First Generation Day

In my high school, I was usually the only Hispanic student in my AP courses, and I see now that it is because I was blessed with such a great support system that I felt encouraged to continue striving for excellence.

Some people may feel pressured to live up to being a million-dollar baby. I have used this to remind myself that I can do anything. I was born in a country where I am given opportunities my parents didn't have, like welfare systems and free and mandatory public education. The opportunity to attend college is a catalyst to open new doors that have never been available for anyone in my family.

However, as I've progressed through my journey at UMary, I have found that even with all the support from my family, I am facing challenges completely distinct from theirs. They cannot relate to the overwhelming stress of papers, lab reports and exams, and I am so lucky that these are my stressors. I have had to find new support. My TRIO advisors, professors, and mentors who have already navigated through college are able to guide me, pray for me, and give me new expectations to reach. I am blessed with the overwhelming support I have on campus and at home. It is through the guidance of the support systems that I have found that I can wake up with the determination that I will be able to continue to fulfill the Lord's vision for me as a million-dollar baby."

TRIO Veteran - Dave Simmons

TRIO works with students from all different walks of life, welcoming all with open arms. We are particularly honored to work with many active duty and veteran students from all branches of the military. TRIO at UMary would like to highlight a student with such a background. Dave Simons, an undergraduate student working towards a degree in Exercise Science, was gracious enough to tell us a little bit about the story of his life as a student and veteran.

Dave has extensive training and experience in the U.S. Marine Corps. He first enlisted in 1996. His service included two tours to Iraq and Afghanistan as well as in the United States. He finished his time as a Marine at the Wounded Warrior Battalion as a recovering service member in 2017. Dave has received several awards for his distinguished service.

David wasn't sure at first why he chose the University of Mary, but over time he began to realize that he was here for a reason. To him, "my time here has made me realize that God has a purpose for me. I believe that my purpose is to deepen my relationship with Him." He first learned about TRIO from the University's Veteran Representative and found that TRIO has provided him with resources that have helped him return to school. These include tutoring and academic advising, as well as aiding him with emotional concerns.

I asked David if there was something we should know about students who are active duty or veterans. "Many veterans are nontraditional students, often older than their peers and may have families or jobs outside of school. This diversity enriches classroom discussions and fosters a broader understanding of various issues. Veterans often possess valuable skills such as leadership, teamwork, and problem-solving, honed through their military service."

The shift from military to academic life can be challenging. Understanding that veterans may require additional support, whether through academic resources, mental health services, or community support is crucial.
